**RCIA:** If you, or someone you know, are interested in learning more about the Catholic faith, please call the office to register. Class begins in September and ends in April of each year.

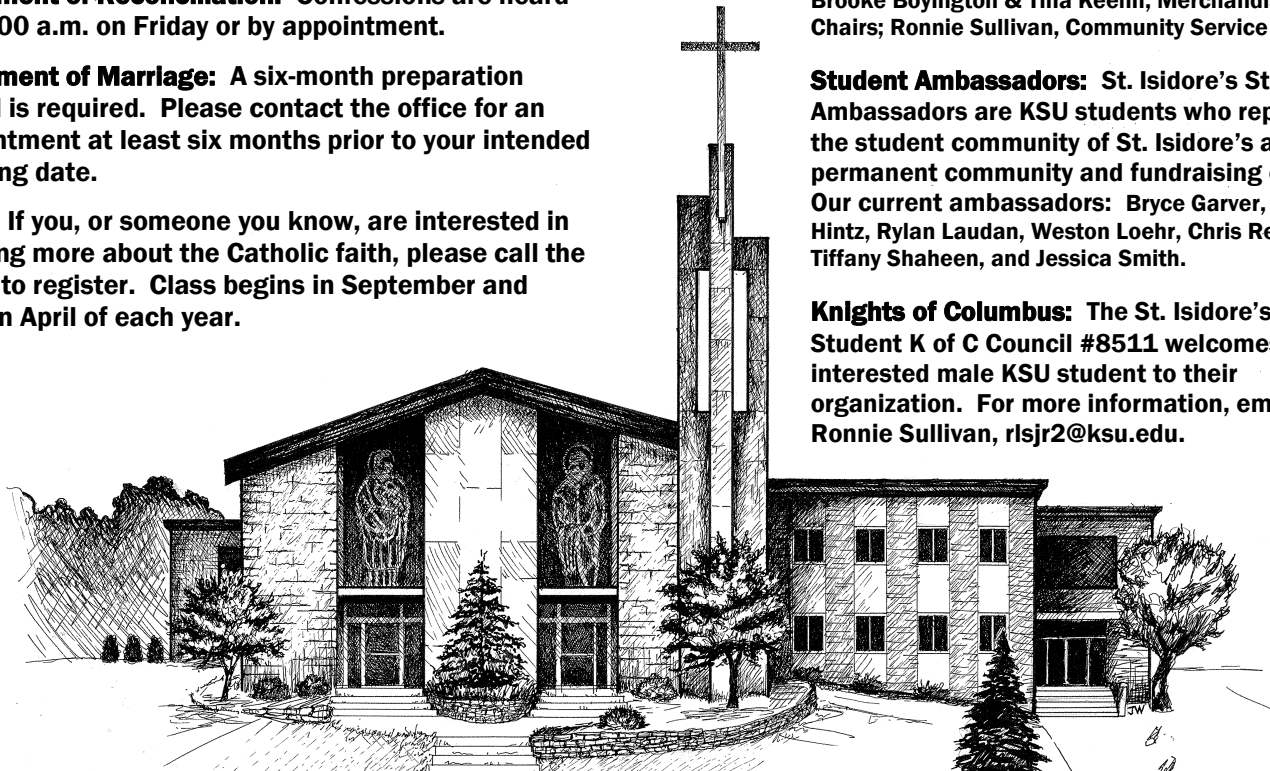

### Liturgical Ministers Training

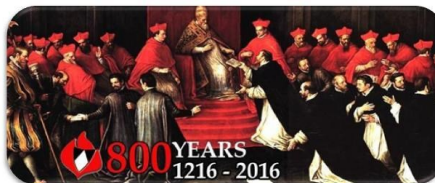

### 13<sup>th</sup> Century Europe and Spain

From the beginning of the Order of Preachers in the early 1200s through its spread throughout Latin Christendom in the same century, those regions we know today as Spain and France experienced quite dramatic changes in fortune. Since the 8<sup>th</sup> century, the Iberian peninsula had been ruled everywhere but in the far north by Muslims, but by the thirteenth century the northern Christian kingdoms became better organized and more assertive. By the middle of the thirteenth century, nearly all of the peninsula was restored to Christian rule in newly prosperous kingdoms, witnessing a growth in the richness of economic, literary, and intellectual culture. Among the French, we likewise witness a move to greater unity and a flowering of culture. In the early thirteenth century, much of France was divided, and especially between the north and the south. Following the aggressive Albigensian Crusade, much of the territory of the southern princes fell to the crown. When St. Louis IX ascended the throne in 1226, he was well positioned to launch a campaign of reform, enforcing royal justice across his kingdom. His long reign (he died in 1270) also allowed him to promote the arts and intellectual culture, not the least of which the University of Paris, along with the new religious communities of Franciscans and Dominicans, who were dear to this pious king's heart.
