RCIA: If you, or someone you know, are interested in learning more about the Catholic faith, please call the office to register. Class begins in September and ends in April of each year.

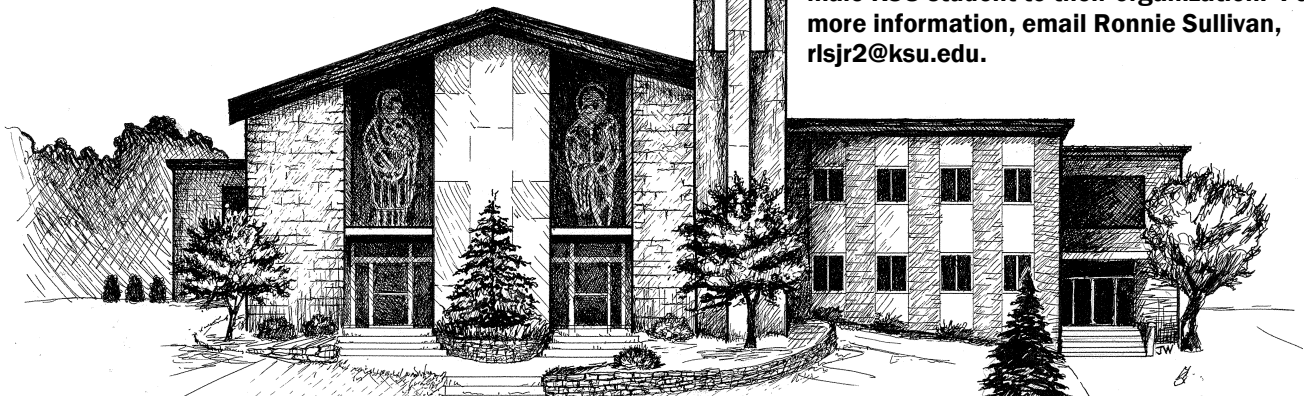

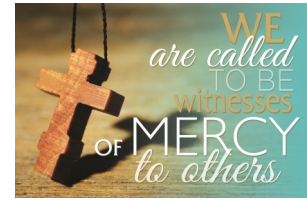

"Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, 'Peace be with you.'" The disciples were paralyzed by fear. After the Crucifixion, they had locked themselves in a room and were keeping a low profile. They didn't want to end up how Jesus had ended up. But the Lord stepped right into this paranoia and dispelled it in an instant: "The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord."

Although these first Christians were very concerned about preserving their lives, the fact is that living holed up in an attic wasn't a life of much freedom or joy. Jesus wanted his followers to have the fullness of life, but this required trust in him and his promises. As today's Gospel puts it, through the belief that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, "you may have life in his name." When we come to really accept who Jesus is, there is no more need for a life of slavery to fear--whatever that fear may be, whether it's fear for our health; fear for our reputation; fear for our comfort; or even fear that our sins are too big for forgiveness.

Today as we celebrate the feast of Divine Mercy, we remember that God's love is strong enough to conquer the greatest of all human fears: death itself. This confidence leads us to a renewed joy. As Pope Francis wrote in his declaration of this, the Year of Mercy, "Mercy is the force that reawakens us to new life and instills in us the courage to look to the future with hope." Once we are firmly established in this hope, we are called to be witnesses of mercy to others. The Holy Father continues with a challenge for all of us, "Jesus asks us also to forgive and to give. To be instruments of mercy because it was we who first received mercy from God."

St. Albert the Great (1206-1280)

St. Albert's friends nicknamed him "the Great," and "the universal doctor" in recognition of his extraordinary genius and extensive knowledge of every branch of learning in his day. He was a philosopher, natural scientist, theologian, administrator, teacher and a keen student of Arabic learning and culture. As theologian, Albert laid a foundation for scholasticism, the philosophical and theological project of the Middle Ages that integrated faith and reason.

In natural science, Albert described everything he encountered in his travels. Fish in the Danube, squirrels in the forest, cattle, deer, birds, insects, and plants all came under Albert's scrutiny so that he was able to give descriptions of such as have not been improved upon even by modern scientists with all the instruments they have at their disposal.

Against the wishes of his parents, Albert became a Dominican friar at age sixteen. By the age of twenty, he was teaching in various universities in Germany and Paris. It was during this period that he became mentor and friend of St. Thomas Aquinas.

From 1254 to 1262 he held various church offices as Dominican provincial, papal theologian, and bishop of Regensburg. In old age his strong mind gradually became clouded; his body weakened by austerities and manifold labors. Albert died in 1280 and was canonized in 1931.
